Report of the Trustees

The Trustees present their annual report and financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31st March 2019. The financial statements comply with the charity's trust deed, the Charities Act 1993 and the Statement of Recommended Practise: Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

Structure, Governance and Management

Cabaret vs Cancer operates as a Constitution of a Charitable Incorporated Organisation. We have been operating as a registered charity since June 2016.

Trustees

At any one time there must be a minimum of three charity Trustees. There has been no change in our Board of Trustees and in line with our constitution there is no remuneration paid to Trustees.

There has been no change to the Board.

If any of the Trustees step down from the Board, a recruitment and selection process for a new Trustee will take place. Future Trustees will be required to serve a 6-month probationary period. This allows the new Trustee and the existing Trustees the opportunity to evaluate their decision. On completion of the probationary period the position will be confirmed for a period of 3 years, which may be renewable, by mutual agreement.

Decision Making

The Board of Trustees meet and consult regularly, they hold ultimate responsibility for the Charity. It agrees the strategy and direction of the charity and confirms grant donations and key financial issues.

Day to day management and administration of Cabaret vs Cancer is delegated to the Chair of the Board of Trustees, in the role of Chief Executive Officer. The charity has no employees.

Objectives and Activities

Over the period of these accounts Cabaret vs Cancer awarded grants which met the Charity's overarching purpose.

The purposes of the charity

To advance such charitable purposes (according to the law of England and Wales) as the Trustees see fit from time to time but not limited to the relief of sickness and the preservation and protection of good health by:-

- advancing the research, treatment, care and rehabilitation of persons suffering from cancer; and
- by making grants and awards to cancer charities and children under the age of 16, who have lost parents to cancer.



Contribution made by volunteers

Our team of nation-wide Ambassadors, Angels and Ally's are collecting donations, staging events and supporting the Board of Trustees as we continue to grow the charity. They continue to be key in growing awareness of the charity throughout the industry.

For the fourth year, thanks to our Edinburgh Ambassador, we raised over £3,000 at the fringe festival in August 2019.

As the official charity of the Twin Peaks UK Festival, the even raised over £700 for our work and the team of volunteers rattled buckets and ran a tombola stall throughout the weekend.

We also became charity partners of the Quizzarding World, a group of Harry Potter fans including our Ambassador Dave Cross, which has raised a significant amount of money

Our event teams work has continued to support our London events, each one giving their time, energy and passion to our charity.

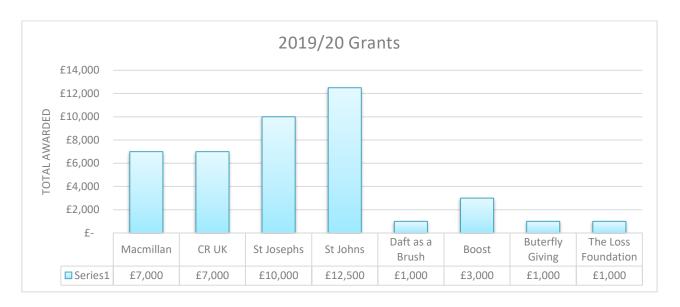


Special Relationships

During this year, the Trustees have continued to build relationships with key staff at our main beneficiaries. This enables us to see how our grants are spent and to ensure that Cabaret vs Cancer grants are being utilised for the public benefit.

Achievements and Performance

Cabaret vs Cancer has awarded institutional grants supporting our purpose. Grants are awarded twice a year, in accordance with our governing body, in June and December. The value of grants awarded is agreed upon by the board of Trustees at bi-annual meetings.



Grants Awarded

The Board of Trustee's continue to award grants, annually, in June and December. In addition, each Trustee, while the funds allow, are allowed to award a special grant of £1,000 to a charity of their choosing in remembrance of a close relative.

This year, Butterfly Giving were awarded £1,000 to help with their Sunshine Bags which are given to teenage cancer patients across the UK. Additionally, £1,000 was awarded to the Loss Foundation who specifically support families after a death caused by cancer.

St Joseph's Hospice Hackney (Child Bereavement Team)

The Snorky boxes, funded by Cabaret vs Cancer in previous years continues to be a huge success at St Joseph's Hospice. Stocks are being replenished, and the team are looking to expand the languages the information is presented in, as well as adapting the kit for older children.

St John's Hospice, Camden

We established The Stardust Fund in St John's Hospice specifically to support children dealing with the loss of a loved one. Thanks to The Stardust Fund, the hospice child bereavement team have been able to support two siblings of primary and secondary school age (whose mother passed away) attend end of year school trips. Their father was caring for them with their older brother who was doing an apprenticeship, with the household juggling caring responsibilities and limited money.



Macmillan Cancer Support

Grants awarded to Macmillan on behalf of Cabaret vs Cancer are directed to the grant giving fund of Macmillan. This ensures our grants are used to support those who need financial aid while being treated for cancer. The money is used to provide grants of up to £250 to those who may need additional financial support, whether for heating, traveling to treatments or to buy items to support their recovery.

Boost

This small company in Cornwall produce modern breast forms for women following a mastectomy. We have provided small grants to enable to the breast forms to be presented to The Mermaid Centre in Cornwall.

Cancer Research UK

Grants awarded to CRUK are used to fund research into cancer and advance treatments.

"Cabaret vs Cancer is an essential organisation, providing high quality performances while raising money to support those affected by cancer.

All performers, crew and volunteers donate skills, and time to support the charity, additionally the team curate other interesting ways for people to support the fundraising work such as the Bowie shop and online auctions.

There is so much passion behind the charity, bringing people together who share a common ground in grief and more importantly empathy. We've all been emotionally affected by cancer in one way or another and it is a huge relief to have such a passionate group of people at the helm of a really compassionate cause."

Achievements of the Charity

Sponsorship

This year significant monies have been raised through the Facebook donation scheme, this includes people nominating Cabaret vs Cancer for birthday celebration fundraising.

We would like to thank Dave Cross, who in June 2019, raised over £2,200 by giving up alcohol for the duration of the 2019 Drag Idol UK.



We ran our first bi-annual FireWalk in March 2019 raising over £10,000, thanks to all the firewalkers and Blaze! We hope to run a second firewalk in Autumn 2021.





Ashes to Ashes

In February 2020, we staged our fifth Ashes to Ashes event, celebrating David Bowie, at Bethnal Green Working Men's Club. During January and February, we also ran our Bowie art and collectibles auction. Our 2020 Ashes to Ashes campaign raised over £5,000 for the charity.

In the summer of 2019, we held Ashes to Ashes at the amazing Wilton's Music Hall. This sell out event in one of London's most historic venues saw us raise over £2,600 as well as supporting the venue, itself a historic charity.

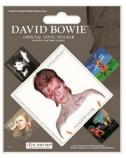
Once again the charity ran a number of online auctions to help raise money for the work of the charity.

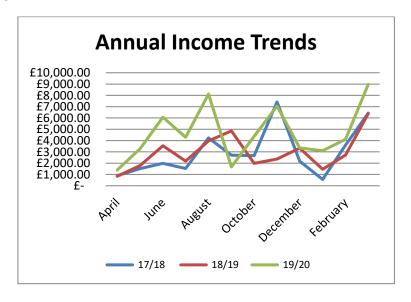
Heroes and Superstars

In December 2019 we held our third grand raffle, raising £800 this raffle, saw tickets sold across the UK to support our work. Once again, thanks to our teams of Ambassadors, Angels and Allies tickets were sold across the UK.





The chart above shows comparative income growth from previous years. However the impact of COVID-19 will, predictably devastate the charities income due to the cancellation of events, reduction in global disposal income and the continued lockdown.

Online Presence

With the closure of Wonderful.Org in March 2020 we are left with no option but to continue our online fundraising through Paypal and Virgin Giving, both of which come at a cost in fees to the charity. We will look for alternatives going forward but also need to consider the public trust in a new platform. We continue to raise funds through Easy Fundraising, a third party shopping portal, and through Amazon Smile.

Risk Management

The trustees have a risk management strategy that highlights key risks. This strategy indicates the principal risk the charity faces is financial stability due to a decline in donations. The ongoing process of income monitoring and reporting help mitigate the risk. Attention continues to focus on risks arising from health and safety of performers, audiences and our event collections team. Our data policy ensures compliance with GDPR. Further risk assessments will be undertaken in line with Public Health England guidance in relation to Covid 19 when we are able to stage events again.

Plans for the Future

The Trustees' overarching intention is that Cabaret vs Cancer should continue to provide grants in line with our purpose; supported by our fundraising community and to the benefit of others.

- > To ensure the health of the charity in a climate of uncertainty and change due to Covid 19
- ➤ Hold auctions including Twin Peaks, Sci Fi and our Bowie art and collectibles
- Explore new revenue streams and income generation ideas.



Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Notes to the Financial Statements For the Year Ended 31 March 2020

1 Accounting Policies

a. Basis of preparation

These accounts have been prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant note(s) to these accounts.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 and the Charities Act 2011.

b. Income

All income is included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- Voluntary income and grants receivable, including donations and gifts, are included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable.
- Investment income is included when receivable.

c. Expenditure

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis. The irrecoverable element of VAT is included with the item of expense to which it relates.

- Costs of generating funds are those costs incurred in attracting voluntary income.
- Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

d. Funds accounting

Unrestricted general funds are funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the Directors. Restricted funds are funds that can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restriction arises when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

e. Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are disclosed at cost with items costing (individually or in aggregate for groups of related items), in excess of £300 being capitalised.

Depreciation is calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets on a straight-line basis over the useful economic lives of the assets concerned. Office equipment is depreciated at the rate of 33%.
